

Through this project, experienced Society educators — current, former, retired - mentor, guide, coach, and support classroom teachers to help students learn.

Most important, Florence Crittenton creates safe environments where youth, young adults, and families can discover the support of a caring community and the possibility of a bright new future.

After visiting the main campus, chapter members shopped at *Flo's on 7th*. This is an upscale thrift shop that supports Crittenton's life-changing programs.

This is The School That Determination Built

The year was 1991 and after five years of pondering and planning the idea, Sandy Breece opened Telesis in Lake Havasu, Arizona. It was called **Hands-On! Learning**, with nine middle-school students.

The purpose was simple: to create a learning opportunity where the students' needs are met first and foremost by wrapping the curriculum around the student, rather than the more traditional method of forcing the student to fit the curriculum. It involves an emphasis on *process*, as opposed to *product*, with individualized curriculum and individualized lesson design at its heart. Determination was the glue that held it all together.

That was 18 years ago and now it is **Telesis Preparatory Academy**, a public charter school for kindergarten through twelfth grade students. Telesis, which by its very definition translated from Greek, means *planned progress*.

The **Academy** now supports an accredited academic program for 325 students, K-12. With more students came the need for more teachers and staff: only 2 in 1991; 35 in 2009! With this growth came the need for more space: one classroom in 1991; 17 classrooms in 2009, plus seven administrative offices, a library, two computer labs, and a conference room in 2009.

Today Telesis is a Character First school with dual accreditation and an athletic department that includes football, girls and boys basketball, co-ed soccer, volleyball, Color guard, and cheerleader squads, as well as a variety of extracurricular sports and clubs.

Telesis is for students who love learning and whose parents and teachers want them to love it. Telesis continues to grow.

Through the diligent work of the chapter treasurers, all the chapters have fulfilled their financial obligations to State and International for annual dues and fees. What better time to examine some statistical highlights of membership!

State membership is now at 949, a decrease of 5.6 percent over last

year. The five largest chapters in the state are Alpha Rho with 43 members, Iota and Lambda with 42 each, and Epsilon and Chilisting 40 members. Average membership of the 33 Omicron State chapters is 28 members.

Several chapters have initiated new members — Alpha, Gamma, Eta, Lambda, and Alpha Eta have three or more new members. Six chapters have successfully reinstated former members.
