

In Touch With Tech

Owning an eReader is as popular these days as having new earphones! There are many different eBook readers available on the market that can be loaded with accessories. The three eReaders that stand out from all others are: the Amazon Kindle, the Barnes & Noble Nook, and the Apple iPad. Each has its own pluses and minuses and all are fabulous devices, but it's easy to become overwhelmed with all of the features. If you're in the market for an eBook reader and are looking at the Kindle, Nook, or iPad, check out the information below to help you make your decision.

The Amazon Kindle

There are three varieties of the Kindle – the Kindle, \$79 – Kindle Touch, \$99 with 3G-\$149, and the Kindle Fire - \$199. The Kindle sports a 6-inch EInk screen, which if you are familiar with, is much easier on the eyes than your traditional laptop or desktop screen. Looking at one, it looks amazingly like a matte piece of paper, and there is no glare or refection It's exceptionally light and sized closer than ever to a mass market paperback book, so it doesn't feel like you are holding a clunky device and it can fit into your pocket! The downside of the Kindle is its refresh rate, which Amazon says they have improved. It's still not quite as fast as flipping a page in a traditional book, and this is because of the EInk screen. But, in terms of the Kindle, it's their best reading experience yet. The Kindle also features the Web-kit browser, which is sufficient if you just to look something up online while you're e reading, but it's definitely not for heavy or regular internet use The latest Kindle version also supports PDF files, which is a major bonus. There's also a feature that allows you to share your books. Should you buy it? This is a great eReader for those wanting just a nice reading experience and aren't concerned with all the bells and whistles. The Kindle Store has just over 900,000 titles to choose from.

The Barnes & Noble Nook

There are actually two varieties of the Nook to choose from, the Nook (\$149) and Nook-Color(\$249). The standard Nook features a 6-inch E Ink screen and is most similar to the Kindle. If all you want to do is read this is a great devise. The NookColor features a 7—inch, full color touchscreen LCD screen, and offers enhanced books, magazines, newspapers, & interactive kids books, and can be used as a media player as well. Both the Nook and NookColor include the unique LendMe

feature, which allows you to share eBooks with your friends, something that the Kindle lacks. Barnes and Noble also has a Lifetime Library, which allows you to store your favorite books for download anytime, anywhere with any device that you have the Nook app installed on. With over 2 million titles to choose from, you've got a great selection of books to read. Should you buy it? If you want lots of choice in terms of titles, the Nook has it. Barnes & Noble has more than twice the number of titles available as the Kindle. If you want an upgraded reading experience, with color instead of grayscale, a nice internet browsing experience, and lots of features, get the NookColor.

The Apple iPad

The Apple iPad is not dedicated eBook reader/ Rather, it is a computer device with eBook reader functionalities and capabilities. The iPad features a 9.1 inch full-color touchscreen LCD, and because of it's larger screen size you can turn the screen horizontally and have 2 pages of an eBook open at a time, just like a real book. Just like the NookColor though, the downsize is that it is LCD, so you might not be able to read on it comfortably for as long as your could on a device with an E Ink screen. The iTunes store offers you both eBooks and audiobooks that you can download to your iPad (as well as your iPhone and iPod). The 2nd generation model has 16GB of storage and \$499, prices and storage capacity going up from there.

Should you buy it?

Casual readers or those who want a tablet computer first that can also serve as an eBook reader will find that the iPad is their choice. Upcoming software update will bring even more reading options, most notable of which is the new Newsstand app — basically an app store for magazines and newspapers. So the iPad is an excellent tablet and is only getting better the larger price and size will give bargain hunters reason to opt for the cheaper competition!

I hope this information has helped in making your decision! **Happy reading!**

During January and February Alpha Beta Chapter collected items for Desert Mission in Sunnyslope. This organization was established in 1927 to address the physical and social needs of destitute families in the desert north of Phoenix.

Today it still has the same focus and mis-

sion, but serves north Phoenix, which covers 152 square miles and more than 400,000 individuals.

In a typical year, Desert Mission serves more than 24,000 people in 10,600 households.

The Desert Mission campus has a Food Bank, Children's Dental Clinic, Community Health Center, Marley House Family Resource Center and the Lincoln Learning Center.

Schools of Historic Tucson

Joan Fox, retired Amphi teacher, has researched the history of schools in Tucson from territorial days to the beginning of the Amphitheater School District.

Dressed in a long black skirt and turn- ofthe-century blouse and boots, Joan shared very interesting and sometimes surprising information about Tucson schools and education.

She brought many authentic props, including an old chalk slate, report cards, schoolbooks, and pictures of schools and educators.

We learned that Brichta was the first school in Tucson. Amphitheater School District got its name because the surrounding mountains shaped the area like an amphitheater.

Students were tested on practical information, including their knowledge of how many bushels of something would fit in a wagon. Joan answered many questions posed by her enthusiastic audience. She taught 2nd or 3rd grade for 38 years. Since retirement she has tutored students from kindergarten through adults, including felons on parole.

World Fellowships Fund

Did you know

The World Fellowships Program began at the 1946 National Convention in San Francisco with a project to aid women in war-torn countries. Four German women educators, with financial assistance from Delta Kappa Gamma members, spent eight weeks of study and visitation in Sweden in the spring of 1948.

The second step toward the present-day World Fellowships Program was the alliance in 1952 with UNESCO to provide special help for Korean women. During 1958-1960, the present program began to take shape, and an agreement was made with the Institute of International Education (IIE) to provide dossiers from which a Society committee could select recipients for study in the United States.

Work with the World Fellowships was originally the province of the Personal Growth and Services Committee. In 1972 the World Fellowships Committee became a standing committee, with state organizations and chapter committees added to the Constitution in 1974.
