Educational Foundation NEWS

In September 2010, a total of \$8,170 was awarded to ten individuals to complete a variety of professional development activities to meet their individual educational goals. Individual awards ranged from \$350 to \$1,320. Next deadline is May 1, 2011.

Professional development awards can be used for National Board Certification. Information is available at DKG.org

A total of \$10,000 was awarded to seven state organizations or other entities of the Society to host seminars that impact education. These seminars are open to non-members. Seminar awards ranged from \$400 to \$2,700.

The Foundation donates nearly \$250,000 each year to improve education. It supports educational projects, professional development, seminars, and other events for learning and training.

Forum Elicits Opinions on Convention Schedule

How do members of Omicron State feel about having conventions annually? Phyllis Swan (Phi) suggested conventions should be changed to an alternate-year schedule.

Ms. Swan and Phi Chapter favor a biennial convention with fall workshops continuing yearly, and adding a one-day training for new officers in even years. Expense and work falling to retired members as active teachers are too busy were primary reasons for their proposal.

The Omicron State Standing Rules only require a convention in odd-numbered years. Having one in even-numbered years is optional.

Those in favor of annual conventions cited loss of momentum, tradition, the revitalization of chapters, and the fellowship of coming together as reasons **not** to change to the alternate-year schedule. Those who favored the change argued that conventions are becoming cost-prohibitive, family and work obligations need to take priority, and money saved could be used for additional scholarships.

No change can be enacted until 2014, as conventions are scheduled through 2013. The discussion will continue until such time as a motion is presented to the Omicron State membership for a vote.

The recipient must carry a full load of classes for both semesters and be an education major. The amount of money should provide scholarships for approximately eight years. A chapter scholarship committee has been established to follow this project through to completion.

Cora was a Society member for almost a 60-years. She was Omicron State President in the 1973-75 biennium. During her biennium she encouraged the state to take a greater part in Project North America at Navajo Community College.

She was recipient of the state achievement award. Later she served as international parliamentarian when Dr. Gloria Little was international president. Cora also served on eight international committees and was a Golden Gift recipient in 1984. She was always proud that she traveled to 16 countries and 36 states during her active participation in the work of the Society.

Many other organizations were recipients of Cora's active involvement. Above all, Cora was a devoted mother to her four sons. She was honored for her excellence as a mother by being awarded the Arizona State Merit Mother in 1971, and the BPW Woman of the Year in 1978. Her most cherished award was the Arizona Mother of the Year Award in 1972.

A celebration honoring her contributions to Delta Kappa Gamma and her community was held in October, 2010, at the Memory Gardens in Bisbee. Members sang several hymns, led by Cinde Shuttner. As members spoke about Cora, roses were placed on her grave. Millicent Kasun sang "One White Rose," a song she had sung at Cora's funeral service.

At the chapter meeting held later, photos, and scrapbooks were on display. Her family was in attendance at this celebration.

Common Core State Standards

What are the Common Core State Standards? Cheryl Lebo, the Associate Superintendent of Standards for Assessment, stated it is an initiative led by Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) and the National Governor's Association for Best Practices (NGA Center), in

partnership with ACT, the College Board, and Achieve to develop common core standards in mathematics and language arts.

These are new standards that teachers will be accountable for the 2014-2015 year. Ms. Lebo suggested that the kindergarten teachers begin implementing these new standards next year, as they will be the first group testing.

The CCSS for math should be available for viewing at www.corestandards.org The criteria are to provide fewer but more focused, clearer, higher standards that will be aligned with college and work expectations. The content will be rigorous with the application of knowledge through higher-order skills.

The intent is that the new standards will improve the chances for Arizona students to compete in a global market.

Volunteers Teach in Panamá

Patricia Rendon (Lambda) and her husband, Fernando, volunteered through NGO, Bridges Across Borders. They served for fiveweeks as mathematics and English teachers at a private school in Jacqué, a small town, population 1,500, in Darién, Panamá. This community has many families who are refugees -- survivors of the violence that occurred in Columbia in the 80's and '90's.

The school is called El Colegio de la Tierra and is in its fifth year of existence. Until now, it has run only on privately donated funds. In Panamá, it is only obligatory to study through the eighth grade, so our students are there because they want to continue their education.

This year, a total of 25 students in tenth, eleventh, and twelfth grades, who range in age from 16 to 22 attend the school. The students are highly motivated to learn English. One of the challenges of teaching at this school is the lack of materials. Our only supplies were a whiteboard and markers, a teacher's edition of the text from which we taught, and notebooks and pens for the students. Another challenge is finding qualified Panamanian teachers who are willing to work fulltime in such a remote area.


