Change is Coming!

International Ad Hoc Constitution Revision Committee member Jo Regenold (Lambda) reviewed the Society's governing documents at a convention workshop. She de-mystified the behind-the-scenes process of discussion and consensus that the committee used to finalize a complete revision

of the *International Constitution and Standing Rules*. The revision will be presented, discussed, amended and voted on at the 2010 International Convention.

The following are a few of the many **proposed** changes Jo itemized in her hand-out and discussed at the workshop:

- "Professional educator" eligibility for active membership is reduced from 3 to 0 years.
- "After retirement" eligibility for active membership is increased from 2 to 5 years.
- In the revision, "Chair" is used instead of "chairman."
 - The Society may be known as DKG,
- Each member may decide how to wear the Society jewelry.
- Scholarships are awarded to members; fellowships may be granted to non-member women educators.
- Future international dues adjustment is to be based on the United States of America Social Security Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA).

These and many other revisions will update our official International Documents to contemporary usage. For a closer look at the proposed changes, members may log on to the Society website: www.dkg.org

Tips on Technology

With 31 years of experience in various educational arenas, International Communications Services Administrator Linda Eller, provided members with insight into building one's personal brand.

Her workshop presentation began with the introduction of the 5 P's: persona, packaging, promotion, product, and permission. These she explained in detail, giving examples of how to apply them. Along the way she incorporated references to several books that would be helpful to members in their pursuit of developing leadership skills. Among them were The Leader's Edge by Susan Hodgekinson, Find Your Strongest Life by Marcus Buckingham, and Make A Name for Yourself by Robin Roffer.

She explained the new social network available to Delta Kappa Gamma members, which requires a member's e-mail address and the password "delta01" to access. There are currently 36 blogs on the site, and several groups have been established which members may join.

In addition, Linda cited some of the newer internet tools members might explore. They included *Linkedin.com*, which is free and interactive and allows members to establish a profile and create an online resume; *Delicious.com* is a free bookmarking tool enabling access on any computer anywhere; and *Skype*, an online telephone conferencing tool, which has both audio and video access.



Themes in Young Children's Writing

The workshop was presented by Maria Paz Gomez, a past World Fellowship recipient from Chile, who is working on her Ph.D. at the U of A. Miss Gomez found the majority of the children wrote about experiences and activities followed by nature, family, and friends. Some wrote fantasy stories and a few wrote about desires, dreams, and aspirations..

Her analysis of the writings was done without knowing the child's gender or ethnicity. After the analysis, she checked to determine commonalities.

Sometimes the gender and ethnicity were predictable, sometimes not. Girls tended to write more about families and friends, boys about activities such as working with dad. Some ethnic groups wrote more about nature and the outdoors.

The discussion at the end of the workshop emphasized the importance of letting children write in an uninhibited environment so that they are free to express themselves.


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Past State President Jinnett Kirk-Shirley Dies
