Alpha Alpha The speaker at the joint Rho, Sigma and Alpha Alpha Chapters meeting was one of the "Lost Boys of Sudan" from the Phoenix Boys Center. The AZ Lost Boys Center opened in 2003 to provide resources for hundreds of "Lost Boys" who fled civil war in Sudan and ended up in United National refugee camps in Kenya. After learning of unsanitary living conditions in Kenyan camps, the U.S. government resettled many of the refugees in America.

**Alpha Beta's** guest speaker at the April meeting was Precious Biyela, the World Fellowship recipient from South Africa. She is working on her doctorate degree in Civil Engineering at Arizona State University. The meeting was held at the Teeter House, a Victorian Tea Room, in downtown Phoenix.

Alpha Zeta (Casa Grande Area) The chapter project is "Against Abuse." A special basket is set out at each meeting for collection. A wish list of items to help women and children in the shelters is available in the chapter basket as well. At each meeting about 20 items are collected.

Alpha Beta Chapter Project is the Angel Society. This non-profit organization, operating in Maricopa County was formed in 198l. Unlike typical emergency shelters that permit a maximum stay of 30 days, the Angel Society Inc. places no maximum time on a child's stay, the average being seven months. This residential care facility for girls has ages from 11 to 18 of varying ethnic and socioeconomic backgrounds.

#### **Tucson Council**

The Tucson Council held its spring meeting on March 1, 2008, under the direction of President Clarine Haslag. A Grant-in-Aid recipient was chosen at that time. The Tucson Council gives a Grant-in-Aid scholarship to a young woman who is graduating from high school and planning to attend college in preparation for teaching. Renee Quihuis, of San Miguel High School, was chosen to receive the \$500 grant for the 2008-2009 school year.

Alpha and Upsilon Chapters will each give a grant-in-aid scholarship to the second- and third-place nominees.

Messages of appreciation were received from the San Xavier Mission School for the financial support given by chapters of the Tucson Council to their Accelerated Reader program. Chapters involved collected funds to contribute to this program so that the school could purchase the books used with the Accelerated Reader Program.

# Proposed International Dues Increase

"After spending many hours in studying, reviewing, and adjusting the budget; after working with the business personnel and financial advisors of the Society; and after making every attempt to resolve the financial needs of our Society; the International Finance Committee, at the advice of the Auditor/Financial Advisor, has submitted a proposed amendment to *International Standing Rules* 4.11 to increase the international portion of member dues to \$40.00.

"The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International operating expenses continue to increase with the cost of today's demands. If we are to maintain the professional services and opportunities to our members, it is imperative that we increase our income to meet these demands."

#### Financial Support Needed

Once more the Omicron State budget for 2008-2009 had to be cut from previous years. Because of the decline in membership, there was again a shortage of about \$700 for the Available Fund.

A dues increase to be voted on at the 2009 State Convention is a necessity for the survival of Omicron State. Officers and committees have already had a decrease in the amount of fund allowed them.

Many are already subsidizing the state by not submitting their expenses. It has reached the point where this is not enough for state-level programs to function.

# Citizen Lobbying: It's not that scary and we need your help

The Honorable Kyrsten Sinema (Alpha Alpha), Arizona legislator from District 15 since 2004, is a local educator and recipient of the Friend

of Education Award.

At a convention workshop she shared a brief overview of the process of moving bills through the House and suggested ways for each of us to be more involved with our state government. Her current concerns are the budget crisis, and ways to avoid cuts in social services and education.

Representative Sinema described the process of bill origination by citizens, lobbyists, and legislators followed by introduction to either chamber by a sitting member.

The chief clerk assigns a number to the bill, and the bill is then sent to committee, where members debate its merits. If it passes, the bill must go to the rules committee to decide on its constitutionality and presentability. It may then go to Caucus and informal debate of the Committee of the Whole, at which point the bill may be amended.

For the third read, the bill goes to a vote of all members who are seated for this public vote. The bill then goes to the other chamber for the same process. Additional processes are required when the two chambers are in disagreement, and the bill is finally presented to the Governor.

In order to be efficient citizen lobbyists, Sinema suggests that any correspondence we send contain bullet points for readability, with important information in bold print.

The AEA keeps an updated chart of current legislation on their website for easy access to legislative bills.

Sinema stated that there are several steps to contact our legislators efficiently. They include learning who our legislators are, scheduling appointments ahead of time, writing or e-mailing, and showing up on lobby days to share the observation space with paid lobbyists. She also said that we should seek areas of commonality with our legislators and be specific about which bill is at issue.

She said that simplicity matters: one piece of paper for correspondence, 12-point font, and fourth grade language and logic. It is important to be non-combative, non-accusatory, truthful, prepared to wait for an appointment, expecting rapid changes in legislative schedules.

Maintaining regular contact with legislators is best, being sure they know that we are their constituents, and including personal information like home address and phone, email address, and a brief, polite message. It is also possible to register at the Capitol to testify in committee. After registration, one can log in from a home computer. In this way, our comments become part of the state legislature's history. With this clear description of the process, any one of us can easily become a citizen lobbyist.

## News from the Parliamentarian

Sometimes committee reports will end in a motion that requires action from members or from the Executive Board. To influence any action that may be taken, members should understand this procedure.

Members may anticipate a motion at the end of a committee report at the 2008 Fall Executive Board meeting. The Professional Affairs Committee may present a motion as a result of their work on Collaborative Connections. This is an international project of the Society, a partnership between a Delta Kappa Gamma chapter or state organization and local schools or school districts. (Information at deltakappagamma.net under Professional Affairs Committee.)

According to Teaching Guide for Pointers on Parliamentary Procedure, a motion is required if the report contains recommendations or a resolution to carry out the committee's recommendations. Immediately after the report has been read to the assembly, the chairman of the committee or other reporting member says, "Madame President, by direction of (or on behalf of) the committee, I move the adoption of the resolution just read." When there is only one recommendation and it is not in the form of a resolution, she makes a motion, for example, "Madame President, by direction of the committee, I move the adoption of Collaborative Connections as the state project."

These motions do not require a second, since they come from committees in which more than one person had already recommended their consideration. They are subject to debate and amendment. The maker of the motion is entitled to speak first in de-

bate if she claims this right by rising and addressing the chair promptly after the motion has been stated by the chair She would then give length and breadth of the project, duration, and cost. Usually it is not wise to "adopt" an entire report, only the motion or resolution at the end.

Omicron State members should watch for this committee action at the 2008 Fall Workshop.
