International Dues Increase

At the fourth business session of the Delta Kappa Gamma Convention in Chicago Friday, July 25, 2008, members addressed the amendments to the International Standing Rules as presented by the International Constitution Committee. Twenty-three amendments were proposed, twenty of which were adopted. The excitement of the day came with the proposed International dues increase of twenty dollars, making total dues for International forty dollars. This was the first proposed dues increase in six years.

The amendment was presented with the rationale for raising dues as being necessary to cover expenses of running the organization. It is difficult to maintain membership services and benefits or to increase services and benefits without raising dues.

The motion was discussed extensively with arguments pro and con. Two amendments were offered to the motion One suggested a small dues increase, and the second increased dues gradually over several years. Both amendments, each of which received some support, were defeated.

The original amendment, reading 4.11 International active dues shall be U.S. \$40 and International reserve dues shall be U.S. \$20 passed. This increase will be in effect immediately.

Re-Certification

Did vou know your involvement in Delta Kappa Gamma can help you maintain your teaching certificate on two fronts?

Your "leadership role" as chapter president can earn up to 30 hours per year towards the 180 clock hours needed for recertification. Obtain written verification in the form of a certificate signed by Omicron State President Dena Martin and keep a log.

Presidents should log chapter meetings, plus dates and times when you worked on meeting agendas and yearbook or made phone calls to chapter members. For each hour of chapter meeting time, you may claim up to one hour of preparation time. Also log attendance at voting functions such as Fall Workshop and Convention executive board meetings, regional and international general sessions.

Your membership role can also count for up to 30 hours per year when you attend professional conferences and workshops. Did you attend incoming office training sessions or workshops last April? Save both the agenda, such as the convention program, and a statement or certificate from the sponsoring organization noting the clock hours. Also save certificates for chapter programs that center on professional development.

City Tours in Chicago

Convention tours offered over ten different ways to explore the fascinating city of Chicago. With an urban population of three million and a suburban population of nine million, the city and its energetic citizenry offer an eclectic menu of ways to experience the Windy City.

One of the most enjoyable stops on the Chicago Art and Art Institute tour was Millennium Park, where "The Bean" is displayed. The Bean is a legume-like structure made of highly polished stainless steel that reflects the city's skyline. Visitors can walk under the concave chamber, where reflections are distorted and multiplied.

Another dramatic display of public art is the Buckingham Fountain in Grant Park. The fountain, built in 1927, has many decorative details including four bronze seahorses. Every hour a magnificent water display erupts, sending a jet of water 150 feet into the air.

The Windy City Experience tour was a coach ride through the Loop area: Chinatown with its unique architecture, groceries, restaurants, and gift stores; the Magnificent Mile with enticing stores and skyscrapers; the Water Tower (a landmark that endured the great fire of 1871); and the Museum Campus, where everyone captured the skyline and lake photographically.

A visit to the Sears Tower added to the day's excitement with tourist rides to the 103rd floor (in only 45 seconds) to view the city from above. The building, commissioned by Sears, Roebuck and Company, was opened in 1973 and stands as the tallest building in the U.S., allowing visitors to see to Wisconsin, Michigan, and Indiana.

Chicago offers so much fun and artistry that it was difficult to come home.

Beatrix Potter: A Life in Nature Linda Lear, St. Martin's Press

Dubuque, the first city founded in the state of Iowa, in 1788, is nestled in the bluffs of the meandering Mississippi River. Across the river is the historic town, Galena, Illinois.

Members listened to local historians tell about the early life on the Mississippi, visited the Field of Dreams in nearby Dyersville, Iowa, dined at the National Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium, and shopped in Galena.

Emergency Fund


