
The 75th Anniversary Planning Committee is pleased to announce a new Raffle to be held at the 2009 Fall Workshop.



Collaborative Connections: T.H.A.T. Program

At the October 25, 2008, Omicron State Executive Board Meeting members approved the adoption of Collaborative Connections as the Omicron State Project.

A similar program has been created in California. Teachers Helping Another Teacher (THAT) was developed to promote visibility in support of teachers.

A workshop at the 2009 Southwest Regional, presented by three Californians, shared the five focus areas of the program: individual teachers, a particular school, a particular school district, community and local government officials, and higher education and professional development.

Members report hours spent and work done in helping another teacher each semester. Tabulation results are sent to International Headquarters. Chapters are awarded certificates at the state convention and a big check is created to show a monetary amount attached to the volunteer hours.

In 2004 Chi State reported 76,908 hours of volunteerism, saving the state \$615, 264.

Ad Hoc Task Force

At the Southwest Regional Ad Hoc Task Force meeting in Reno regarding restructuring Society committees, the following recommendations were made by members. Replies from each of the regions will be forwarded to the Revisions Committee for their recommendations.

Revision Committee members are meeting with the Constitution Committee for items which might be presented at the 2010 International Convention

Diane Sheets (Alpha Beta) has been the Arizona representative on this committee and Jo Regenold (Lambda) is a member of the Revisions Committee.

- 1) There should be face-to-face meetings at least once per biennium for all committees.
- 2) Consider changing the title of the Program of Work Committee to Program Services Committees.
- 3) Program of Work Committees change of name should still include the following sub-committees:
 - a. Program of Work
 - b. Personal Growth and Services
 - c. Professional Affairs
- 4) Professional Affairs Committee responsibilities should be expanded to include research aspect of committee work, thereby eliminating a separate Research Committee.
- 5) The international president could appoint an Ad Hoc Committee for specific research when needed.
 - 6) Program Committee should include

Fine Arts component of committee work rather than having a separate Fine Arts/Music chairman.

- 7) A Non-Dues Revenue Committee should be named which would include the elements of Society insurance.
- 8) The current responsibilities of the Personnel Committee should be reviewed. Acquire a professional PR/Consultant/Marketing individual to work with the Communications Committee for members and nonmembers. This would necessitate a revision of the Communications Services Administrator position.

Yes, you may earn credits by attending Regional and International Delta Kappa Gamma conventions.

I used thirty hours each year, under the category of professional (education-related) conferences and workshops, for my teaching certificate renewal. Enrollment is through a web-site, www.paec.org, and enrollment must take place before the convention starts. Directions for enrolling are given in *The Delta Kappa Gamma News* prior to the convention. The site also accepts your answers to the activity questions and then prints a certificate for you upon completion.

Questions to complete the course can be downloaded ahead of the convention. The questions usually ask the registrant to apply information learned to our personal and professional lives and are somewhat specific to the information given at the convention. The questions are thought-provoking and interesting to answer.

I found that I need to set aside a minimum of six hours to complete the questions, as well as attending sessions and workshops and taking some information from them.

I hope you will join me next year at the International Convention in Spokane, Washington, and enroll for credit.
