Zoom Instructions for Fall Workshop

GET THE APP

To use Zoom you must first download the application. Go to zoom.us/download and click on Download for Zoom Client for Meetings if you are using a desktop computer or go to the appropriate app store for your mobile device whether it's Apple, Android, Google, Samsung, etc. and search for Zoom. Install the app following the appropriate onscreen directions.

You will not need to sign up to join a meeting. You only need to sign up and have a free account if you want to host a meeting.

JOIN THE MEETING

You will receive an email invitation from a meeting host which will contain the meeting topic, the scheduled time for the meeting, and a link to join the meeting.

A few minutes prior to the scheduled meeting time click the meeting link contained in the email you received, and you will be prompted to launch Zoom. You may be prompted to use your computers audio and camera. Allow these both.

PARTICIPATE IN THE MEETING

Once you are in the meeting, there are a couple things you should know to help facilitate a useful meeting for yourself and an orderly meeting for all participants.

- 1. In the bottom left corner you will see two icons, MUTE and STOP VIDEO (you may need to mouse over the video screen to see them). Please MUTE your audio. Unmute only if you must ask or answer a question. Also, if you are interrupted with a phone call, cats, bathroom breaks, etc. please check that the MUTE and STOP VIDEO buttons are on so is not interrupted. - 2. In the upper right corner, there are a couple more icons that you should be aware of. These are GALLERY VIEW and SPEAKER VIEW.

For the classes which we will be hosting you should select SPEAKER VIEW along with muting your audio.

3. Please use the Chat function, bottom center, and direct your comment or question to the person you want to respond, not to "everyone."

Mary Pat Lansing (above) is a member of Epsilon chapter from St. David. Mary Pat has been a constant contributor to music events in the communities of St. David and Benson for her entire life. She has played piano and organ for the Benson Catholic Church and the St. David Monastery for many years. She continues to participate in the Community Choir, playing piano, writing her own compositions, and conducting for their programs throughout the year.



Sue Mueller (left) is a member of Alpha Delta chapter from Scottsdale. She is a Sunday School teacher, teaching grades 6-9. She also serves as a deaconess planning special events for women and families. She teaches Women's Bible

studies, plans game nights, hosts craft events. She visits an elderly member of the church and takes her on outings so she can enjoy cards with friends. Weekly, she volunteers at Standing Stones Christian Academy reading to small groups of children. She also serves at Vice-President of the Christian Academy Council. Sue is an active member of "Project Linus" where she sews and turns in 4 to 5 blankets monthly for children in crisis. Sue has assisted in delivering food items to the Standing Stones Food Bank from AASRA member donations.



Marge Threewit (above right) is a member of Alpha Beta chapter from Phoenix. Marge is very actively involved as a community volunteer. At the Adobe Mountain School, part of the juvenile correction system for girls in AZ, Marge works as a mentor at the facility once a week, twice a month she participates in a food and devotional gathering and on the 3rd Monday of the month, facilitates a birthday celebration for the girls. In addition, Marge is busy with ASRA, serving as a unit president, creating the monthly newsletter, and has served as the treasurer. Marge also sings in her church choir and serves as a table leader for Bible study.

ACTS OF SERVICE

Arizona DKG members certainly serve their communities. The **DKG AZ Serves** data shows that over 185 individual members volunteered 12,010 hours and gave \$3351 in donations. Also, chapters gave to the community by donating 329 hours and \$1450 through group projects. In total for the year, approximately 22,309 community members were served by approximately 373 AZ DKG members giving of their time and money.

Schools for Africa became the Society's first official international project in 2010. Over the ten-year period DKG members have donated over \$450,000. In 2019, ten Arizona chapters donated to the Schools for Africa program through UNICEF. Their combined total contribution was \$843.03. The SFA mission involves providing access to quality basic education for children, focusing on girls, orphans, and other vulnerable youngsters within 21 countries in sub-Saharan Africa.

Omega's Alice Rice had no idea her move from a large home to a smaller apartment would impact hundreds of people, all from donating craft and quilting fabrics. Chapter member Judy Lewis used Alice's and her own fabric to stitch dozens of carefully ironed adult-sized face masks for veterans, older children, and numerous friends. Her preferred method: a contoured fitted pattern with cord or flat elastics looped through stitched channels. Janet Vickers coped with a summer shortage of elastic by substituting shoelaces. Omega's new Chapter President Janet Blum added still more masks to the fun. For the grand finale, Kathy Chesser wowed everyone by crafting an astounding 150 festive child-sized and adult face masks, with adjustable color-coordinated elastic ear loops, and pockets for coffee-filter inserts.

Members chose to donate adult sizes to the Veterans Administration, and children's face coverings to Title I Pueblo Elementary School. Omega's Chapter President Janet Blum is a former PTO president for Pueblo, and several members had taught with Principal Shelley Hummon, Omega's friend and former DKG member, so reconnecting with Pueblo felt like attending a family reunion.
